With more than 25,000 interactions across Frankston residents, partner agencies, and community services, demand for assistance has continued to rise as our community faces growing housing and cost-of-living pressures. Nationally, the cost-of-living crisis has dominated public discussion – and locally, it continues to drive more people to the doors of emergency relief providers like CSF.

In last year's report, we welcomed a record number of first-time clients, with 791 individuals and households in Frankston City seeking financial or food assistance from CSF for the first time. Over the past 12 months, this number has increased to 869 – a clear sign of the deepening financial strain affecting our community. Importantly, this figure represents only new clients and does not include the thousands of people who continue to rely on our support each year.

Many new families have sought assistance as a direct result of the ongoing housing and cost-of-living crisis, with private renters among the most severely affected. Residents who once managed their living expenses are now struggling under the weight of rising rents, soaring utility bills, and higher everyday costs – leaving many at risk of financial hardship and, in some cases, homelessness.

The sharp increase in housing costs, combined with the shortage of affordable housing in Frankston, has left many families and individuals in increasingly vulnerable situations. Our data continues to show that private rental tenants experiencing housing stress make up the largest proportion of our client base, with a higher proportion of women seeking assistance. This trend highlights that the housing crisis is not a temporary challenge but a sustained issue requiring long-term, coordinated responses. CSF remains committed to supporting those affected as housing pressures continue to grow across our community.





We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the hundreds of volunteers and supporters who form the backbone of CSF. Their dedication and compassion are the driving force behind our work – sustaining us through challenges and change, and serving as both the first point of contact and, for many, the last line of support for people in crisis. Without our volunteers, we have no service, and we deeply appreciate the contribution each of them makes.

We are also deeply grateful to Frankston City Council for its ongoing in-kind support, and to the Federal Government for its significant Emergency Relief (ER) grant funding. This year, CSF secured a new five-year ER funding agreement with the Department of Social Services — a vital investment that strengthens the long-term stability of our services and enhances our capacity to respond to growing community needs.

On behalf of Frankston residents who continue to face financial hardship, we remain committed to advocating for increased government funding, social justice, and stronger support that more accurately reflects the rising demand for emergency relief within Frankston.

We extend our sincere appreciation to our many partners for their ongoing collaboration and generous contributions to our Emergency Relief program. Their shared commitment enables us to meet the evolving needs of Frankston's most vulnerable residents with compassion, care and practical assistance. We are equally thankful to the many service groups, local businesses, philanthropic organisations and community partners whose ongoing support allows CSF to deliver a wide range of essential services to those in need.

This year, a generous donation enabled CSF to deliver targeted Emergency Relief to women and children experiencing family violence – a growing and urgent area of need in our community. This support has been truly life-changing, helping us provide safe communication devices, pay critical bills and cover essential expenses such as car registration for those left without resources or hope.

Additional philanthropic grants allowed more than 500 Frankston residents to access essential medicines, including PBS prescriptions and other vital treatments. These contributions have had a profound and lasting impact, supporting mothers and children in crisis refuges and ensuring continued access to life-sustaining care. Without this generosity, much of this essential work would not be possible.

CSF has always been more than an emergency food provider. While food security remains central to our mission, we recognise that true stability requires more than access to meals – it demands financial resilience and holistic support. Our approach extends beyond food relief to include assistance with utilities, medical costs and housing, helping individuals and families regain stability and independence during times of crisis.

We are also grateful for the contribution of our co-located and outreach partners – including Bolton Clarke's Homeless Persons Program, Services Australia and the Mental Health Legal Centre – as well as the Frankston Emergency Relief Providers Network for their steadfast commitment to supporting our community. The combined efforts of these groups, volunteers and staff reflect the strength and compassion of our community sector, and we are proud to stand alongside them in our shared mission to support Frankston's most vulnerable residents.

CSF also extends its gratitude to all volunteers and donors of the Frankston Community Appeal for another successful fundraising effort this year. Their generosity provided hampers, toys, vouchers and essential items to support those most in need. As we approach the 35th anniversary of the Appeal, we celebrate the enduring spirit of community kindness and compassion that continues to define this important initiative.

As financial pressures intensify, strong leadership and a coordinated approach to relief are essential. CSF remains steadfast in its mission to address the root causes of financial hardship and to support individuals in rebuilding their lives with dignity. This vital work is only possible through the continued collaboration and support of our partners, volunteers and the broader Frankston community.

Community Support Frankston has again experienced another busy year providing Emergency Relief and other Services to residents in the City of Frankston.

The demand for assistance continues to increase as the rising cost of living impacts our vulnerable clients.

Due to the prudent management of finances by the Board our Organisation has a healthy Balance Sheet with Net Assets of \$623,883 which includes both Administration and Emergency Relief funds of \$562,243 and minimal Liabilities.

Emergency Relief income for the year was \$713,295 with Grants from Department of Social Services, Department of Families, Fairness and Housing and Donations being the major source of funding for the programme.

Expenditure for our Emergency Relief programme was \$564,123 and covered a wide range of needs with Food, Food Cards and Phone/Utilities being the primary areas of assistance.

Administration income received was \$38,459 and included Donations and Bank Interest on investments.

Expenses totalled \$263,202 and included Volunteer/Staff, Training/Supplies and Stationery/Office Supplies. Depreciation was \$13,719.

Due to a change in circumstances the Board of Management has assumed the role of employer of our two Community Support Officers and Administration Officer who are an integral part of our Emergency Relief Program. Wages and associated costs were paid from Department of Social Services Grant.

The Material Aid Fund Trust Income was \$72,128 and included donations to our yearly appeal and Bank Interest which provided the funding of \$52,298 to stock Christmas hampers for the underprivileged in our community.

We acknowledge the generous support received from Frankston City Council for the provision of our building, payment of some major running costs and in-kind support of our Manager and Operations Co-Ordinator.

The support, both in-kind and monetary, received from various Businesses, Organisations and residents is very much appreciated and included Peninsula Kingswood Foundation, Frankston Rotary, Frankston Rotary Sunrise, Frankston Lions Club, Magistrates Court and South East Water,


Favourite local spot in Frankston?



Celebrating Our Partnership with Operation Larder

Community Support Frankston is proud to partner with Operation Larder, whose generosity and dedication is unparalleled. As our largest food pantry partner, Operation Larder ensures that local individuals and families experiencing hardship have access to nutritious food and essential groceries. Beyond providing food, they also contribute volunteer support, strengthening the network of care that sustains our community. This partnership is more than a supply chain - it is a lifeline of compassion, collaboration, and resilience. Together, we help safeguard food security and bring hope to Frankston residents in need.

Their ongoing commitment also plays a vital role in the Frankston Community Appeal, where they supply hundreds of items to help fill hampers and bring comfort to families during times of hardship, as well as partnering with CSF on events throughout the year.

Our main liaison with Larder is Julie Burnham – an amazing lady who is an integral part of the Appeal, and who works with CSF volunteers to secure thousands of grocery items for the hampers (including driving to 7 different supermarket locations to get half price hams). Julie also oversees CSF's weekly Foodbank pick-up and is often off in her own car to buy items we've run out of – tremendous effort.

Founded over 40 years ago, Operation Larder has been guided by the tireless efforts of community leaders, including Mrs. Dawn Peacock (President), Graham Peacock (Treasurer), and until recently, Nylma Carruthers (Secretary). Nylma, who sadly passed away earlier this year, will be remembered for her extraordinary dedication. Every Monday morning, Nylma would arrive at CSF, check pantry stock, purchase supplies, and restock shelves - an inspiring effort, especially in her seventies. Nylma's warmth, generosity and unwavering commitment touched everyone she met. Nylma will be deeply missed, forever appreciated, and always be part of the Annual Appeal and CSF family.



OZ HARVEST

Oz Harvest play a vital role as a supplier of free fresh fruit and vegetables. This support ensures vulnerable members of our community have reliable access to healthy, nutritious food—an essential foundation for wellbeing. By providing high-quality fresh produce, Oz Harvest helps to strengthen local food security and helps ease the burden of food costs for individuals and families facing hardship. This partnership is not only about nourishment, but also about dignity, care, and hope, ensuring everyone in Frankston has access to the essentials they need to thrive. According to Oz Harvest estimates, CSF has assisted with 10+ tonnes of rescued food, and 10,000+ kg of CO² saved.





FOODBANK

Foodbank's support provides bulk pantry staples at significantly reduced cost, alongside free bread, fruit, vegetables, and frozen meat/meals. This year alone, their contribution is conservatively estimated at \$120,000, making a substantial impact on our ability to meet growing demand. Bolton Clarke Homeless Persons Program (HPP)

Bolton Clarke's Homeless Persons Program supports individuals who are homeless or at risk of homelessness, many of whom face complex physical, mental and psychological health challenges. The team delivers primary healthcare directly to people in need - whether on the streets, in parks, at food programs, or in crisis and low-cost accommodation such as hotels, boarding houses and caravan parks. In addition to professional nursing care, HPP connects clients with health, housing related needs, meals, legal and financial assistance. At Community Support Frankston, the dedicated Claire and Nikky provide this vital, compassionate support to clients in extremely vulnerable circumstances.



Department of Social Services (DSS)

The DSS once again provided additional funding to support CSF this year in responding to the significant increase in demand for emergency relief, largely driven by the current cost-of-living crisis. Many individuals and families across Frankston are struggling to afford essentials such as food, housing and utilities, placing enormous pressure on already vulnerable households. With this vital funding, CSF was able to sustain and strengthen the delivery of emergency relief services, ensuring those most at risk received timely assistance, care and support during what continues to be an incredibly difficult and uncertain period.



Frankston City Council

CSF is grateful for its strong partnership with Frankston City Council, which continues to provide vital in-kind support, including our building, some staff wage support and other associated costs.



Services Australia

CSF is fortunate to have a nominated Community Engagement Officer from Services Australia working alongside us to support highly vulnerable community members, particularly those at risk of homelessness. As one of their external colocations, CSF provides a vital access point for this service, which assisted hundreds of Frankston residents this year.



FERP NETWORK

CSF continues to convene the Frankston Emergency Relief Providers Network (FERP) quarterly meetings with a range of volunteer and non-volunteer related welfare providers.



Australian College of Optometry

CSF operates a regular Optometry Clinic, giving clients the opportunity to access free eye health checks from a qualified optician. This service is especially important for those who may otherwise go without essential eye care due to financial hardship. For low-income earners, prescription glasses are also provided at no cost, with expenses covered by CSF.



Mental Health Legal Clinic

The MHLC are a free mental health legal clinic located in Frankston, offering low-income earners, who are unable to access other free community services, free legal advice on a range of issues that may be impacting their life. CSF works closely with this organisation in arranging appointments for Frankston residents with a range of legal matters.



Frankston Magistrates' Court

Since the 1980s, the Frankston Magistrates' Court has been a valued supporter of CSF, directing funds from penalties imposed by Magistrates to our Emergency Relief Program. These funds provide vital assistance with essential costs such as food, housing, utilities, petrol, medical and pharmaceutical needs, and accommodation, ensuring meaningful support reaches those experiencing hardship in our community.



Australian Tax Office (Tax Help)

Each year CSF operates a Tax Help Service for Frankston residents. This service operates between July and October, where qualified Tax Help volunteers assist those unable to afford an accountant. This is a free and confidential service that is well utilised each year.
